The majority of staff in education, childcare and children's social care settings will not require PPE beyond what they would normally need for their work, even if they are not always able to maintain distance of 2 metres from others. PPE is only needed in a very small number of cases:

School biometrics and touchscreen entry control systems are **not** disabled during the Covid-19 guidance pandemic for staff fob registering entry & exiting site: for # biometrics and/or other access control systems are disabled for visitor use (and staff if COVID-19 no remote fob type log in/out); visitors during the pandemic will generally be discouraged from attending site unless there is no other option, visitor access will be logged in and out manually on a record sheet or similar by reception staff. Primary Schools; only Nursery, Year 1 and Year 6 pupils to attend initially (from June 15th) in line with Local Government guidelines. SEN Schools, other Primary School Groups, Nursery & Secondary Schools; years 10 and 12 are to attend initially (from June 1st onwards as directed by the LEA) in line with Government guidelines. Classrooms have been laid out (with marking tape where necessary) so that 2m social

distancing (in all directions) can be maintained where possible. Or classroom desks & chairs

have been laid out to ensure 2m social distancing for pupils, with the Class Teacher Under having a 2.5m wide working (width of the room) zone area / corridor at their normal current teaching position guidance for COVID-19 All desks face the same direction i.e. front of the classroom. Windows and doors will be opened during lesson times to allow for ventilation of the room Air conditioning units will be isolated (circulation of potentially stagnant contaminated air) until further notice. Classes are split with no classroom holding more than 15 pupils as per government guidelines whilst ensuring seats can be laid out maintaining 2m distance (note; most primary schools are finding that classrooms will only hold 8-12 pupils maintaining social distancing): Pupils will then be kept in their small groups ('bubbles') and should not mix with other groups during the day. Where possible, the group should be allocated one classroom to contain the potential spread of the virus until restrictions are lifted Wherever possible, staff supervising a cohort should also remain within this 'bubble' Teachers should ensure that all staff and students wash their hands regularly throughout the day particularly when eating and at the start and end of activities. Playtimes should be reviewed to ensure students keep a safe distance. LOW Equipment i.e. keyboards, laptops, ipads, etc., should be cleaned throughout the Under school day current guidance Classes should be kept together and mixing with other classes minimised, as much as possible. COVID-19 Start & end of the school day; where possible, pupils should go directly to their 'bubble' classroom and be collected / leave directly from that classroom. Stagger group arrival and leaving times if practicable. Staff should keep a minimum of 2 metres when collecting and releasing students to their parents Within Secondary Schools and College settings there will be a requirement for subject specialist rotation of staff; this will be managed to limit mixing as much as possible. All classes are to take place in the same setting wherever possible to limit the numbers moving around the school, **keeping the 'bubble in one area**

Timetables should be revised where possible to reduce movement around the school premises and to stagger busy transitional periods between classes.

Dining room be laid out to maintain 2m social distancing as far as is reasonable practicable. Alternatively, schools meals will be served or packed lunches taken in the group's classroom at each individuals desk, minimising the risk of virus spread via touching surfaces. Note; if the kitchen/dining facility is used for school meals, there will be NO BUFFET and the school will review how cutlery is allocated.

Tape marking applied to dining room to indicate social distancing in the line for school dinners. Schools may choose to manually supervise the social distancing and not undertake this recommendation to mark floors, etc.

Dining room tables and chairs will be wiped down between sittings.

Soft furnishings, soft toys and toys that are hard to clean (such as those with intricate parts) are removed from classrooms and stored elsewhere. Knitted fabric chairs & other furnishings (computer rooms, teacher's classroom chair and staffroom chairs, etc.); consider plastic protective covers if not viable to isolate in a storage area. Alternatively clean daily with a 'fogging' disinfectant machine:

ULV/Fogging machines allows the disinfectant to be passed through the unit, which generates an airborne mist of micro-droplets. These droplets diffuse through the treated area and settle out onto surfaces, meaning that the material used will be active both as a space spray and a surface spray.

The key to successful use of ULV is the production of an optimum size of spray droplet. It must be small enough to remain airborne without being too small to hit surfaces – research has shown the optimum droplet size to be around 15 microns. These droplets are small enough to be carried on air currents into small cracks and crevices that are hard to reach using conventional cleaning and spraying, yet still heavy enough to settle out within an hour, so that treated areas can be re-entered with the minimum of delay.

All unnecessary items are removed from classrooms and teaching environments as much as possible.

In certain SEN and Nursery / EYFS environments, maintaining 2m social distancing will be near impossible – Central Government's Policy appears to be that for some pupil groups, not complying with social distancing is scientifically acceptable as children / young persons are at low risk from any serious consequences of covid-19, staff protection measures in this category should be reviewed. The school is to review measures to protect staff & pupils in this group, including:

Contact with staff whilst handling a pupil; review EHC plans and risk assess (if required) vulnerable pupils attending a Referral Unit or alternative provision. Note; If a risk assessment determines that a child or young person's needs continue to be more safely met at home, local authorities, educational settings and parents should consider whether moving either equipment or services into a child or young person's home would enable them to be supported there. This may be a more feasible solution for day settings than residential settings, and may include:

- o physiotherapy equipment
- o sensory equipment
- o online sessions with different types of therapists
- o phone support for parents in delivering interventions
- o in-person services, where necessary

Intimate care; nappy changing and similar:

• Is PPE required for tasks involving changing nappies or general care for babies?

Staff should follow their normal practice when changing nappies and caring for babies more generally, provided the child is not showing symptoms of coronavirus. This includes continuing to use the PPE that they would normally wear in these situations, for example aprons and gloves. If a child shows symptoms, they should not attend a childcare setting and should be at home.

- How should I care for young children or children with special educational needs who do not understand why they must stay apart or who ignore distancing guidelines?
  - Young children and children with special educational needs may not be able to understand the need for social distancing and may also seek close interaction with their peers or adults to provide reassurance at a period of disruption to their routines.
  - It is imperative that education, childcare and children's social care settings conduct risk assessments around managing groups of children within the setting. This should include limiting the number of children in each group and reducing this to provide more space in each classroom or learning area. As far as possible, small groups of children should be supported by consistent staffing, and groups should remain as consistent as possible throughout the outbreak.
- Also see; Supporting children and young people with SEND as schools and colleges prepare for wider opening. Extract from Updating Risk Assessments (please read all of this section in the on line document for SEND pupils); Following the partial closure of education settings from 20 March 2020, we asked local authorities to consider the needs of all children and young people with an EHC plan and to carry out a risk assessment.
