## Notes from Mrs Reilly and Miss Sultan

Thank you for the overwhelming response to the attendance questionnaire sent out via the parent app (if you are not yet connected, please speak to a member of the Office Team, who can help you get connected). With all of your fantastic contributions, we felt it was important to respond and clarify some of our school policy regarding attendance and the reasoning behind our strategies.

This letter will address some of the points you raised, to enable us to continue to develop the work being put into help our school community to tackle attendance and punctuality together.

### A parent(s) said...

It is down to the parent or guardian with parental responsibility to ensure their child/children attend school at primary level.

As a school, we could not agree more. Section 7 of the Education Act 1996 places a duty on parents to ensure that their child of compulsory school age receives a suitable education by regular attendance at school. However, Schools also have a safeguarding duty, under section 175 of the Education Act 2002, to investigate any unexplained absences.

Schools have to regularly inform the Local Authority of pupils who are regularly absent from school, have irregular attendance, or have missed 10 sessions or more without the school's permission.

If a registered pupil of compulsory school age fails to attend school regularly, the parent could be guilty of an offence under section 444 of the Education Act 1996.

Until school has a reason for absence, we have to consider any unexplained absence as a missing child, which must be followed up, in the interest of the child, to ensure they are safe.

### A parent(s) said...

#### Penalties are unfair

Penalties are only issued when parents/guardians keep their child off so regularly they become classed as **persistently absent** (90% or below, which by the end of the year is equivalent to just under a month off school) for **unauthorised absences**. It is vital to provide reasons for your child's absence to avoid it becoming unauthorised. Any child nearing a persistently absent level will have received a 'Nearing Persistent Absentee' letter, to notify and give families the opportunity to improve their attendance or identify if they need help. Regular day-to-day illness tend not to keep a child off for the number of days that would bring a child's attendance as far below as 90%. Under no circumstances does school encourage you to bring a genuinely ill pupil to school, particularly if they are contagious.

Genuine medical conditions <u>will not</u> be penalised. Parents are required to provide evidence of doctor/hospital appointments or letters, which is even easier now via the parent app. If a family is struggling, our attendance team is always here to support and will have been in contact with the family to identify if help is needed. We are a community and are always here to help when needed. If you are struggling, make contact with either Mrs Lightfoot or Miss Sultan to discuss your situation.

A penalty is £60 and can rise to £120 if unpaid within 21 days. It is worth noting that it is actually £60 per pupil, per parent in cases of absence within term time. To avoid this school will put strategies in place to support your family, with the aim of working back to general expectations as soon as possible. If a registered pupil of compulsory school age fails to attend school regularly, the parent could be guilty of an offence under section 444 Education Act 1996. In April 2017, the Supreme Court held that attending school "regularly" means attendance in accordance with the rules prescribed by the school and not "sufficiently frequent attendance". This means that a child must attend school on every day that the school requires him or her to do so and failure to do this may lead to the commission of an offence.

### A parent(s) said...

## A targeted scheme should be in place aimed specifically at those persistently late and absent

We are pleased to share with you this does take place. Attendance is monitored on a daily basis by the attendance team. This is our **First Response** system to ensure school knows where every pupil is every day to ensure they are safe.

The Attendance Team meet with the Attendance Lead and Educational Welfare Officer on a weekly basis to put strategies in place to support families. Within this meeting we-

- Monitor <u>every pupil's</u> attendance below 95% to ensure it is improving weekly if it has fallen
- Identify trends and patterns of absence that can lead to poor attendance for <u>all</u> pupils
- Identify families who may need additional support and arrange a meeting with school
- Identify and put into place next steps for persistently absent pupils (every persistently absent pupils attendance is monitored daily and home visits may take place to ensure we can support these families to come into school)
- Arrange Educational Welfare Officer meetings with families when families fail to improve their attendance
- Identify pupils at risk of becoming persistently absent and notification is arranged to alert families
- Identify necessary penalties for consistent unauthorised absences that have resulted in a pupil becoming classed as persistently absent.

### A parent(s) said...

### I do not agree with the class rewards

We appreciate that not every strategy we put in place will be supported by everyone. It is school's responsibility to motivate and educate pupils on our expectations. Liverpool schools are all working to improve attendance to ensure our children have the same opportunities as children nationally. Class rewards are just one method we use to help drive the pupil's enthusiasm for building these life skills and the majority of the children absolutely love it.

### **Whole School Assembly**

Attendance assemblies have taken place since the start of the year, and have been made a part of the Friday celebration assembly. Classes receive a class cup for attendance of the week and a certificate for their door. 100% attendance for the week for a class also receives an additional prize. We are very proud of the systems we have in place for the pupil's and have loved the suggestions you have made. Attendance certificates are handed out at the end of term for 97% and above and for 100% attendance to celebrate individual attendance. We want to reward children who have 100% but also do not want to penalise those that come to school all year but were unfortunately ill once during the year. Having 97/98% as a target accommodates this. We do not count holidays in term time as a reason for absence within this figure though.

#### A parent(s) said... My child has not received a reward for their attendance

Every child with 97% or above receives a certificate at the end of term, as well as class prizes. It is our expectation that every pupil works towards 97% or above attendance to be in line with our regular attendance expectations. As a school we are limited by the financial climate also and as much as we would love to be able to buy every child a prize, it is just not feasible. This is why we have taken a prize draw approach to it. We want the child that does win to have a really special prize and on occasions we look to have prizes donated and sponsored by whatever means possible. This has enabled us to have additional prizes at special times, such as Christmas. However, as a token of appreciation for the point raised, this half term we will reward every child with good attendance with a small prize in recognition for their daily efforts. With our prize draw returning at the end of Spring 2.

## Dog on the School site (For everyone):

Just a gentle reminder that **dogs** are unfortunately not allowed on our school site. This is a directive given by Liverpool (Health and Safety) to all schools and includes the whole of our site. Some children are unsure when around unfamiliar dogs and others are very frightened. **Even though you know your dog, they do not.** Dogs are also familiar with their owners and may play beautifully with their own family children, but can change behaviour when around other children.

Dogs are unable to use our school toilets! If a dog happens to go to the toilet on the playground, we are required to disinfectant for the safety of all our children. A dog did actually urinate on a pupil earlier in the year, which makes this rule all the more important.

It is therefore safer and fairer for all our children that dogs (<u>carried</u> or <u>on a lead</u>) do not come onto our School site.

Thank you for assisting us with this important rule.

Schools often have a School Dog – in this case, schools have carried out detailed risk assessments and have parental permission for any interaction with it.
